The Center provides access to speakers, panelists, and discussion leaders on topics such as making the transition towards non-sexist liturgy, integrating women's studies into Jewish school curricula, and bringing women into positions of leadership in Jewish organizations. Life Cycle Consultants

Rabbis, cantors, and other experienced

leaders are available for consultation on creating life cycle ceremonies and rituals.

Rosh Hodesh Groups

The Center provides resources for coordinating groups to celebrate Rosh Hodesh (the new moon), Tu B'Shevat and Passover seders, and other annual and life cycle events.

Jewish Feminist Research Group

The Center sponsors an ongoing group of scholars and teachers who share their research on the intersection of Judaism and feminism. This group is co-sponsored by the Institute for the Study of Women and Men of the University of Southern California.

1. Beginning at the Beginning: Claiming Judaism Rabbi Emily Feigenson

This class will give participants the tools to feel strong and confident as Jews in the synagogue and at home. We will confront our feelings of exclusion from areas of Jewish life and practice, and by studying about and prac-ticing Jewish rituals and customs, we will discover ways to claim a Judaism that is authentic and empowering. (6 sessions.)

Emily Feigenson, who has a rich background in Jewish education and a special interest in informal education, serves as assistant rabbi of University Synagogue.

2. Talmud for Beginners

Rachel Adler An introduction to the essential text of rabbinic Judaism from a feminist perspective. We will use the Soncino English translation and Steinsaltz' Hebrew edition. No prerequisites. (8 sessions.) The class is limited to seven students.

3. Introduction to Jewish Mysticism

Olivia Schwartz Together we will enter the rich world of Jewish mystifor the weight of the through the feminine perspective of a follower of this tradition. We will begin our study with mystical approaches to God, Torah, and the levels of

the soul. (6 sessions.) Olivia Schwartz, a teacher who has studied many spiritual traditions, is the co-director of the Los Angeles Chai Center.

4. Jewish Parenting: Confronting New Challenges, Creating New Models Rabbi Jacqueline Koch Ellenson As we raise our Jewish children in this complex world,

we confront changing notions of family, community, and Jewish parenting. Topics discussed in this class may include: talking about God and prayer, incorporating Jewish rituals into family life, non-traditional families in the Jewish community, and encouraging a positive Jewish identity in a non-Jewish world. (6 sessions.)

5. Introduction to Jewish Feminism

What are some of the ways that feminism challenges traditional notions of Judaism? How do feminists approach traditional Jewish texts? How have Jewish feminists looked for a language of prayer that both acknowledges our experiences of God and enables us to pray within a community? How do Jewish feminists envision community? This six-week course will introduce some of the topics that will be examined in greater depth in Institute courses offered in the Winter and Spring. (6 sessions.)
